TOPIC & PURPOSE:

This report reviews the total statistics related to crime and calls. This public report is to keep our community and the Prince Albert Board of Police Commissioners informed on statistics.

BACKGROUND:

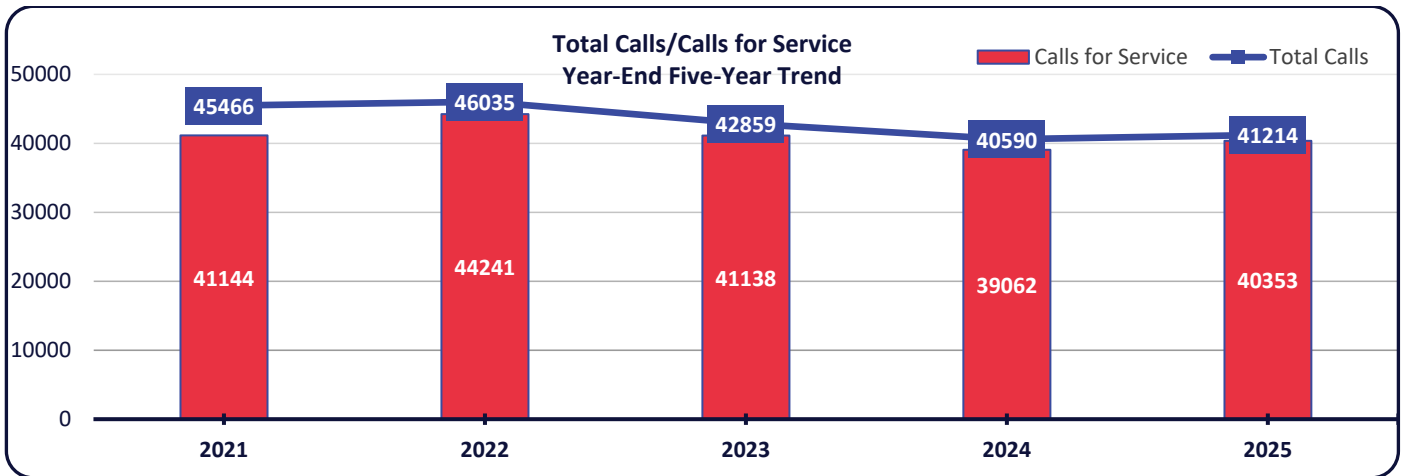
Year-end and fourth-quarter statistics, which include October, November and December statistics related to crime and calls are captured, reviewed, and released to the Board and public. The information in this report is measured and compared to previous years and is provided to identify anomalies or trends. This information can be used to determine community and organizational needs and support decisions on resource deployment.

Calls For Service

The **total calls** for 2025 were 41214. This is an increase of 1.54% from the previous year.

The **proactive calls** or “neighborhood strengthening” efforts in 2025 were 795. This is a 40% decrease from the previous year. There were 66 court related occurrences.

The **calls for service** received in 2025 were 40353. That is an increase of 3.31% from the previous year. Disturbance calls increased by 57.69% from 8195 (2024) to 12923 (2025). This increase is due to a change in call classification. The “eviction” type, previously used for certain calls was retired, and such calls are now disturbances. A disturbance is a behavior that disrupts the peace, such as fighting, shouting, swearing, playing loud music, using obscene language, or refusing to leave when unwanted. Family disputes calls increased from 660 (2024) to 902 (2025). Intoxicated Persons calls decreased by 14.44%, from 1884 (2024) to 1612 (2025).

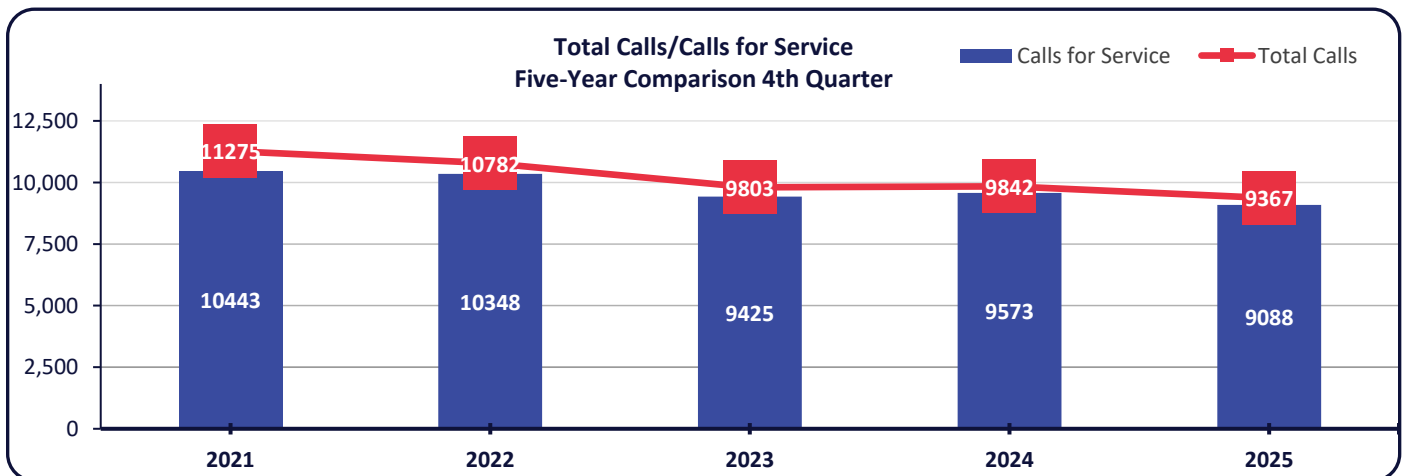


Appendix 1: five-year YTD trend

The **total calls**, for the fourth quarter of 2025 were 9367. This is a 4.83% decrease from the previous year.

The **proactive calls** or “neighborhood strengthening” efforts in the fourth quarter of 2025 were 263. This is a 12.39% decrease from the previous year. There were 16 court-related occurrences.

The **calls for service** received in the fourth quarter were 9088. That is a decrease of 5.07% from the previous year. Disturbance calls increased by 47.27% from 1976 (2024) to 2910 (2025); Suspicious persons decreased by 36.38% with 558 (2024) to 355 (2025).

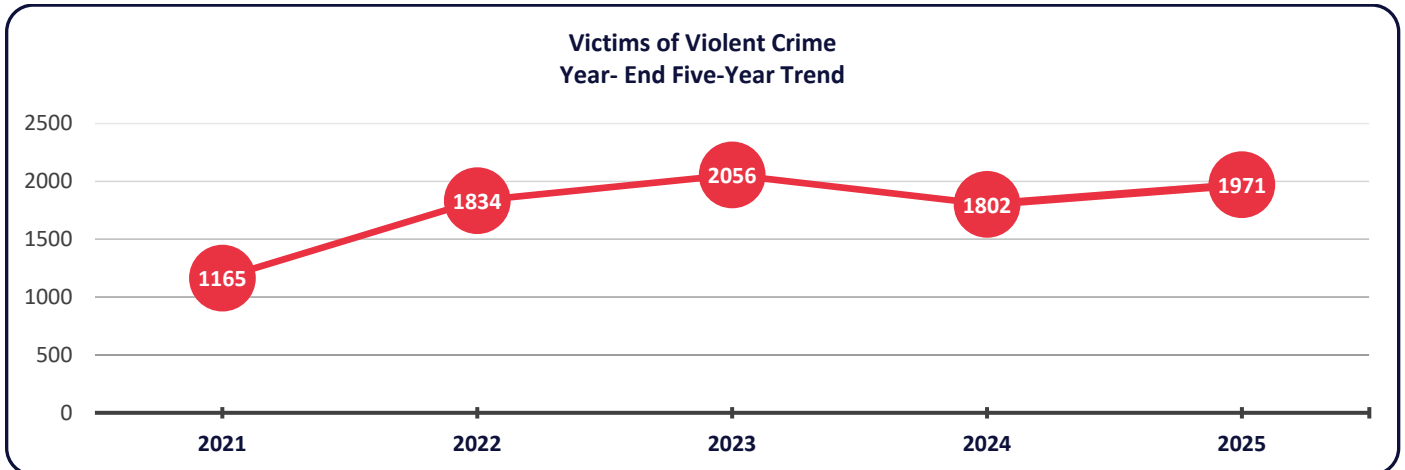

Victims of Violent Crime

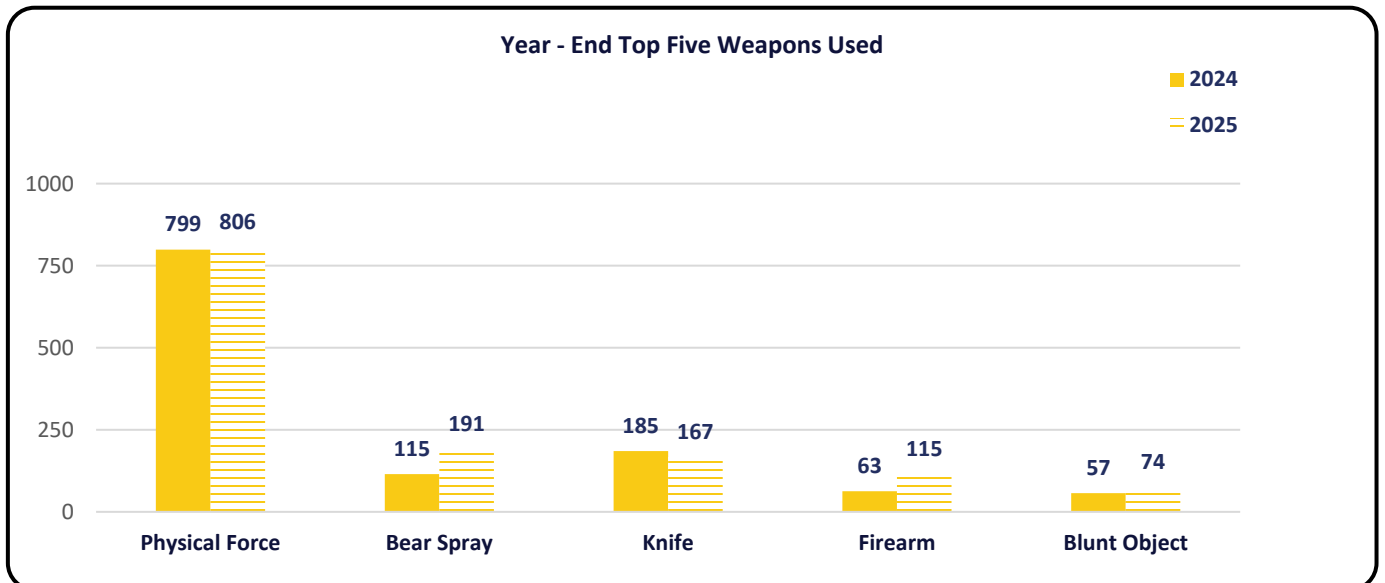
In 2025, there were 1971 victims of violent crime. This is a 9.38% increase from the previous year. In 702 occurrences, investigations resulted in criminal charges.

The five-year average number of victims of violent crime YTD is 1766.



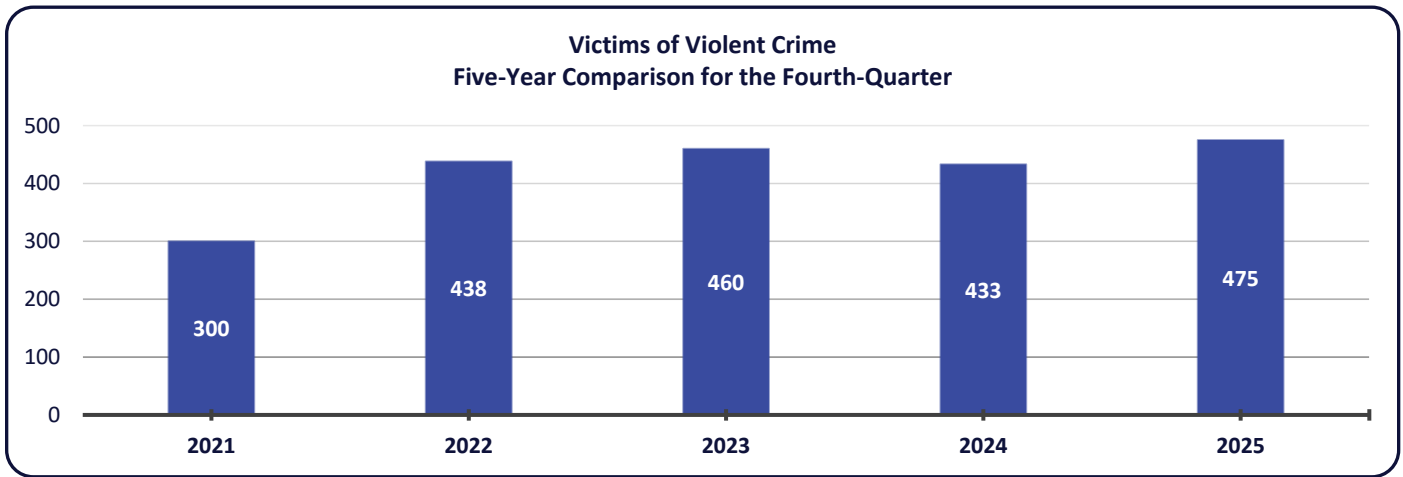
Appendix 3: five-year YTD trend

Top five weapons used in 2025: physical force 806, bear spray was used/brandished 191 times, a knife was used/brandished 167 times, a firearm was used/brandished 115 times and a blunt object was used/brandished 74 times.

In the fourth quarter, there were 475 victims of violent crime. This is a 9.7% increase from the previous year. In 163 occurrences, investigations resulted in criminal charges.

Homicides

In 2025, there were six (6) homicides. In three (3) occurrences, the investigations resulted in criminal charges.

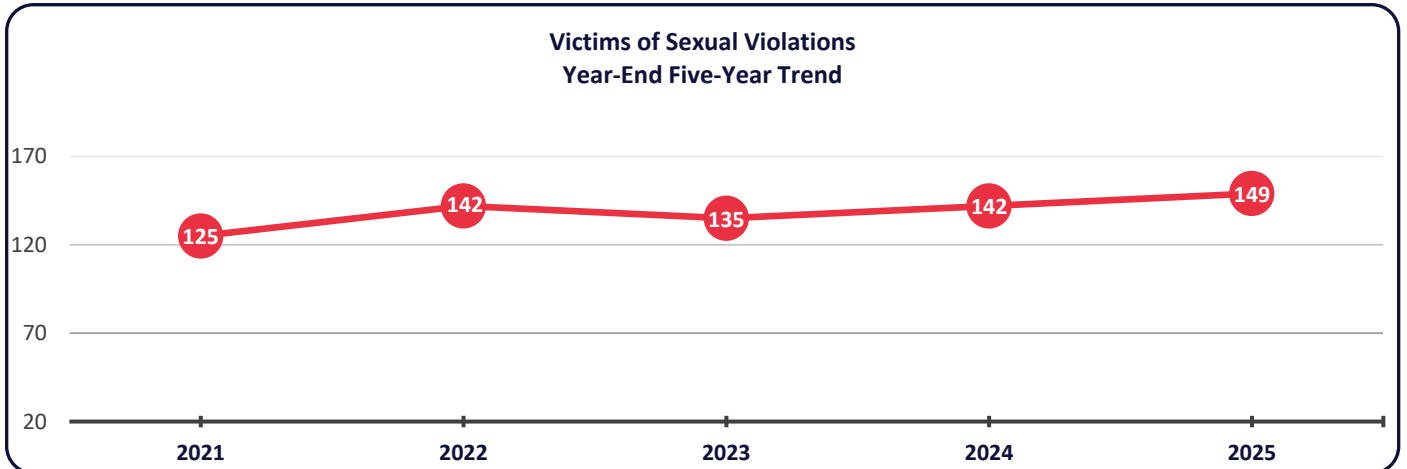
There is a 600% increase in Attempted Murders, from zero (0) in 2024 to six (6) in 2025. In four (4) of those occurrences, the investigations resulted in criminal charges.

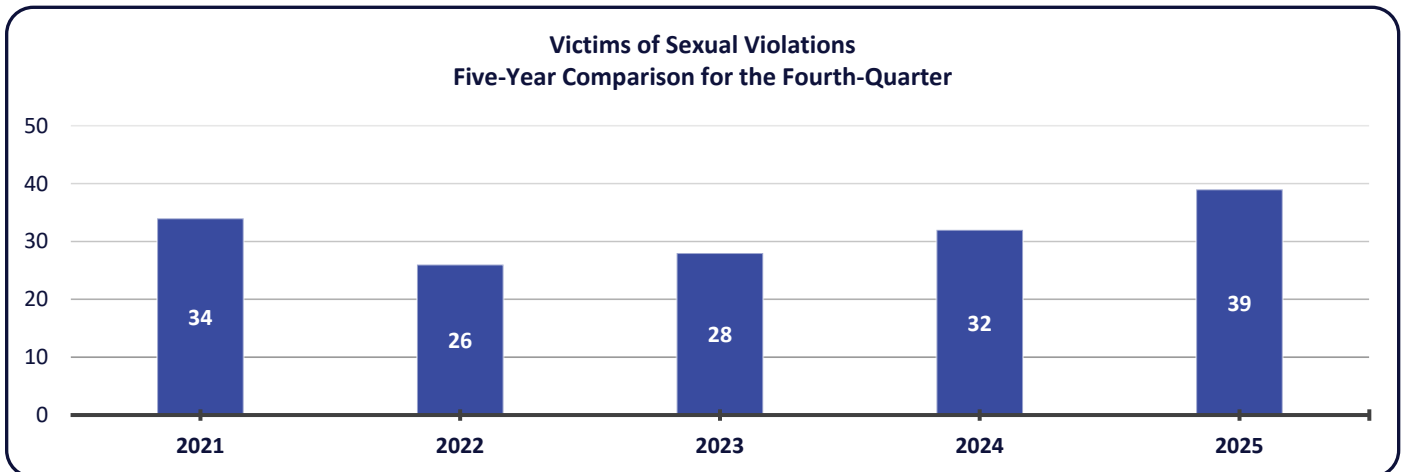
Victims of Sexual Violations

In 2025, there were 149 victims of sexual violations. This is a 4.93% increase from the previous year. In 40 of those occurrences, investigations that have led to charges.



Appendix 7: five-year YTD trend

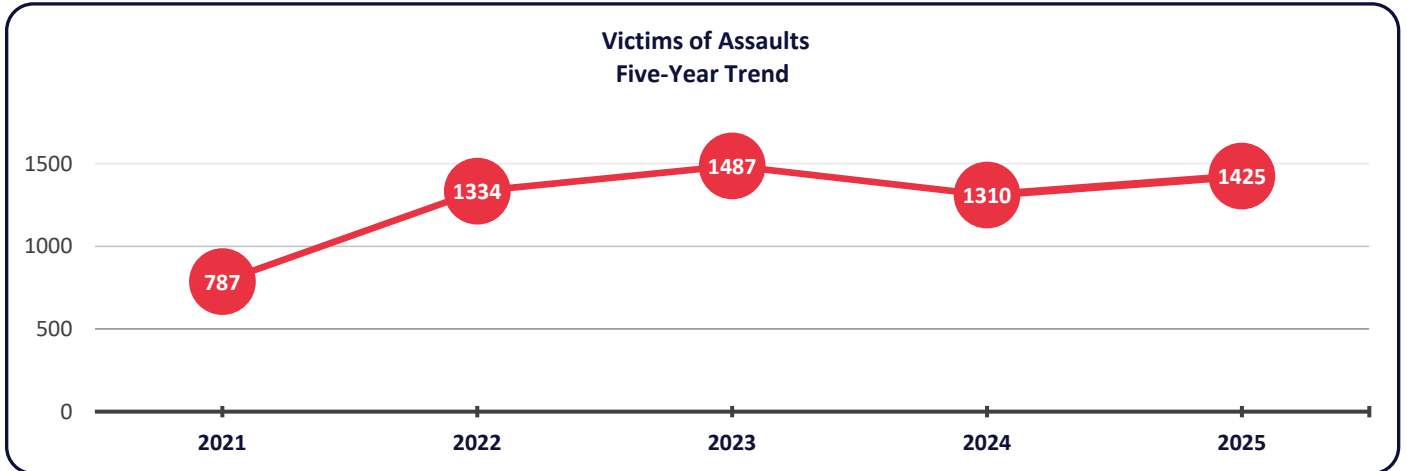
In the fourth quarter there were 39 sexual violations reported, which is an increase from the previous year.

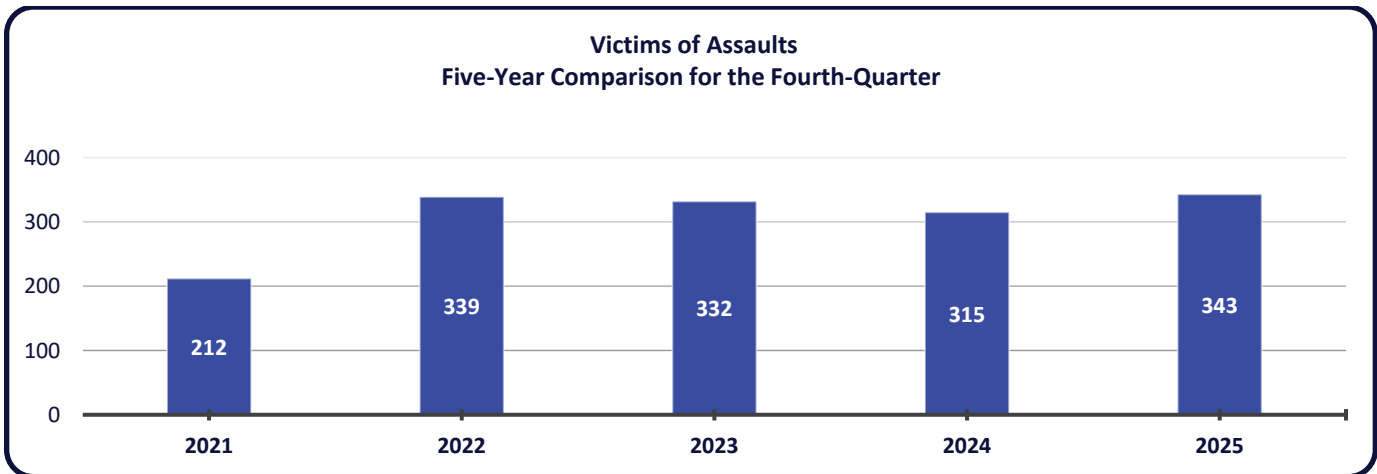
Victims of Assault

In 2025, there were 1425 victims of assault, which is an 8.78% increase from 2024. In 581 occurrences, investigations resulted in criminal charges.

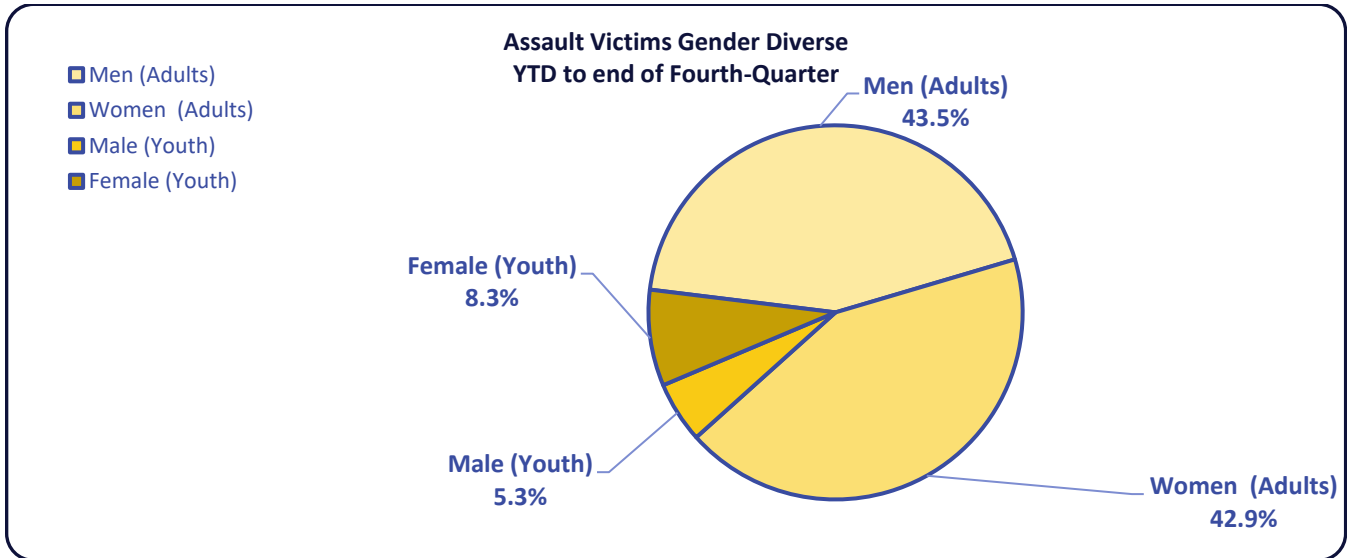


Appendix 9: five-year YTD trend

In the fourth quarter, there were 343 victims of assault, which is an 8.89% increase from 2024. In 140 occurrences, the investigations resulted in criminal charges.



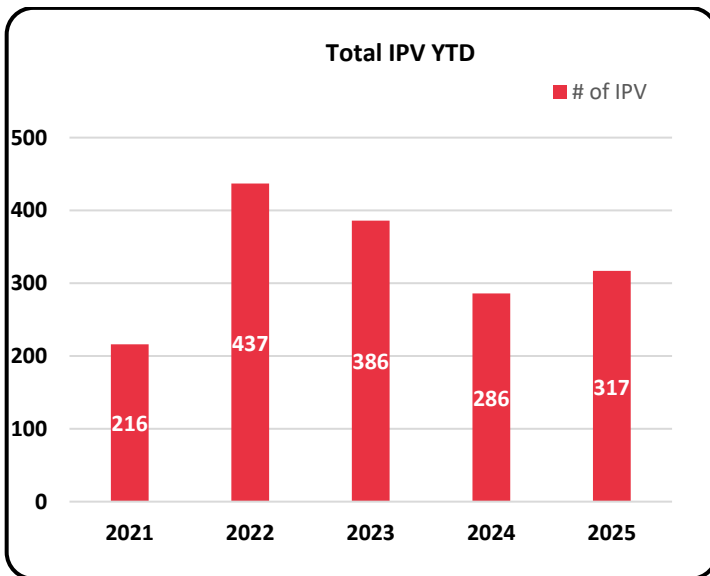

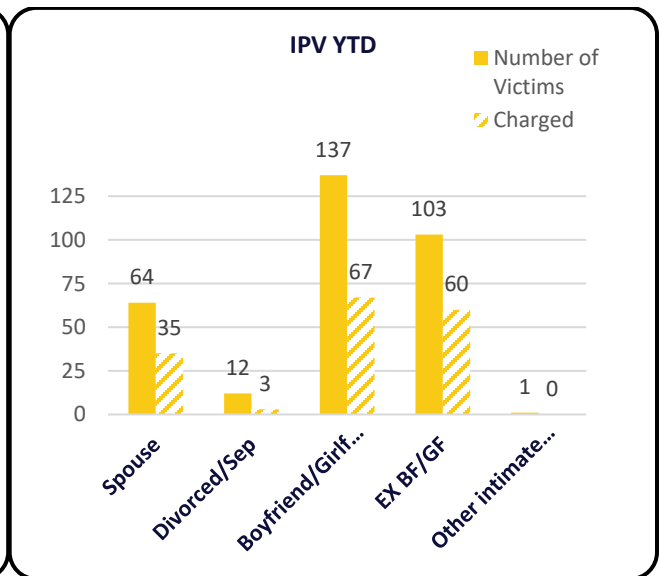
Appendix 11: age & gender/sex of victims

Intimate Partner Violence

In 2025, there were 317 occurrences that were intimate partner violence (IPV). In 165 occurrences, investigations resulted in criminal charges. In 141 occurrences, the suspect and victim lived in the same residence. The victims; 3 male youth, 11 female youth, 256 women and 47 men.



Appendix 12: Total IPV YTD



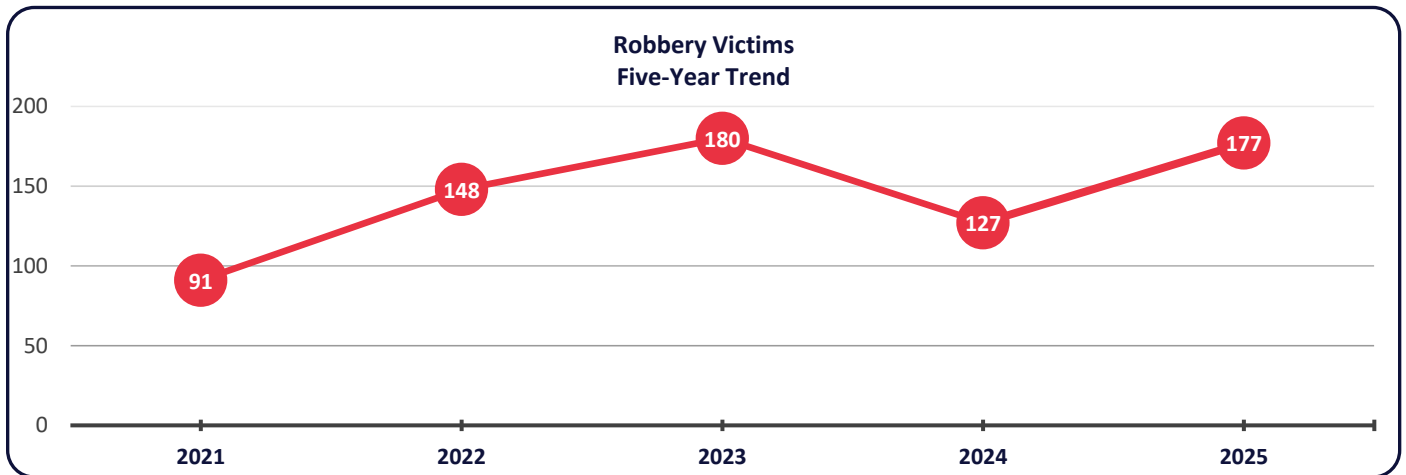
Appendix 13: IPV Relationships

In the fourth quarter, 81 assaults were intimate partner violence (IPV). In 44 occurrences, investigations resulted in criminal charges. In 44 occurrences, the suspect and victim lived in the same residence.

Robberies

In 2025, there were 177 robbery victims in 157 occurrences. In 66 occurrences, investigations resulted in criminal charges.

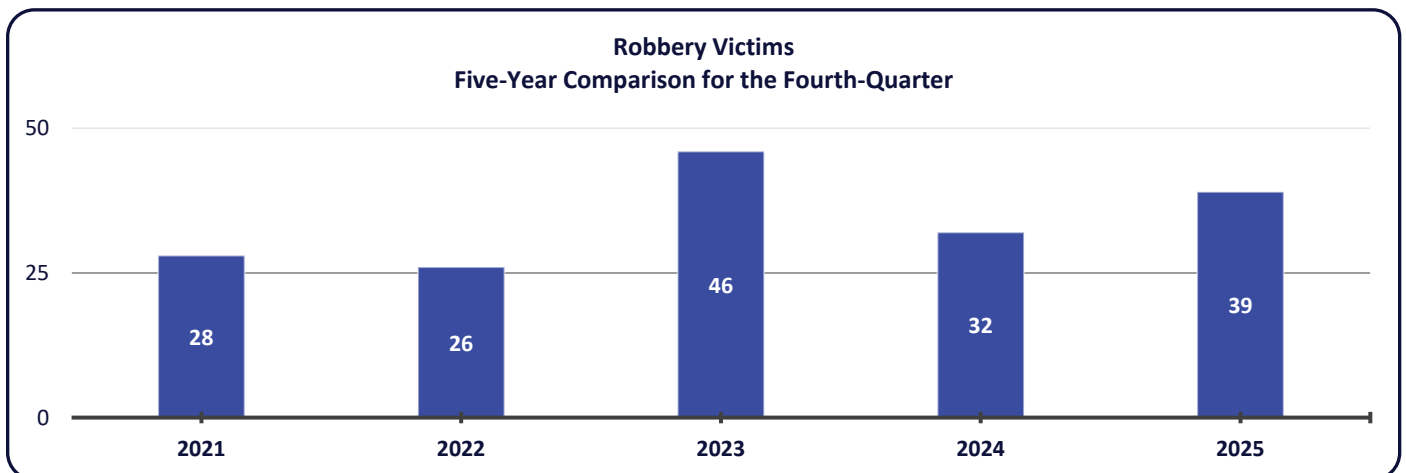
Victims were targeted in 50 occurrences, 83 were open air, and 24 were robberies of businesses. There were 45 robberies involving a vehicle being taken (or attempted to be taken).



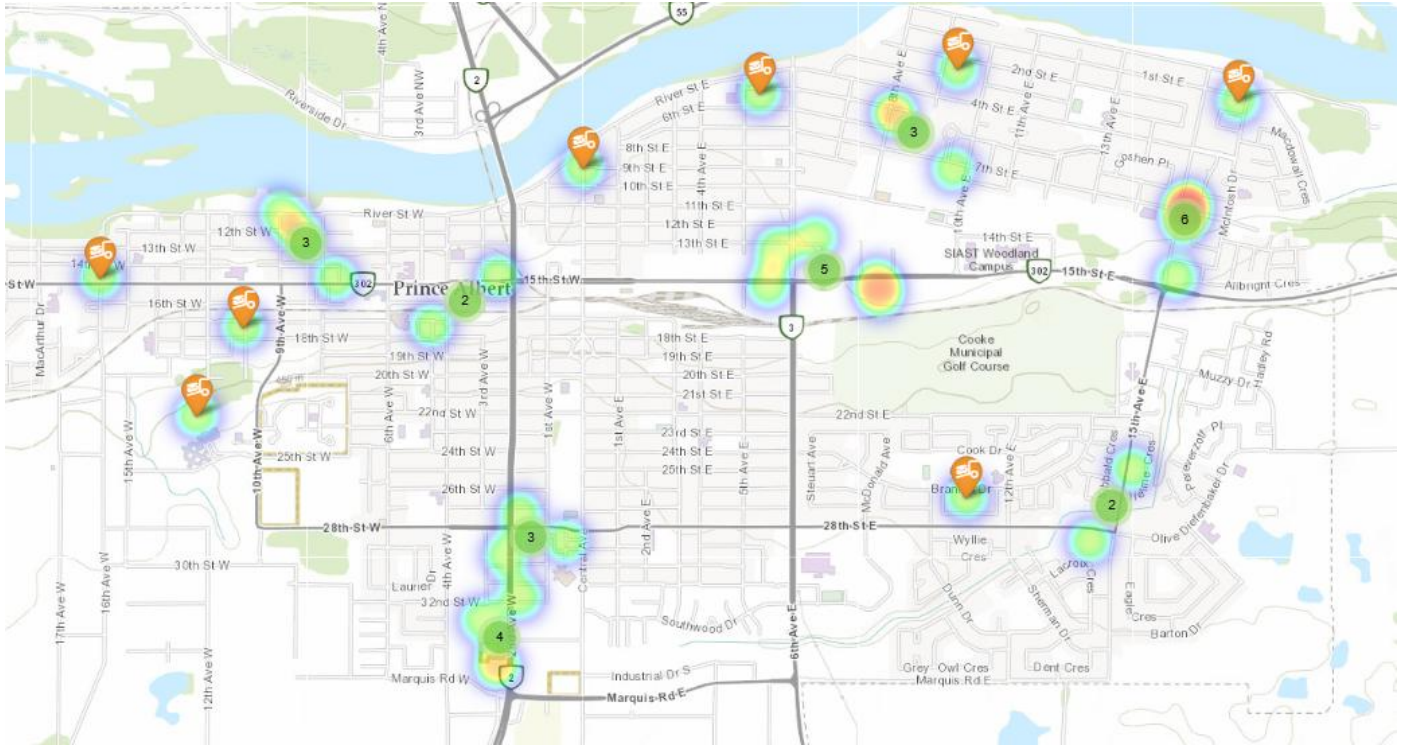
Appendix 14: five-year YTD trend

In the fourth quarter, there were 39 robbery victims in 36 occurrences. In six (6) occurrences, investigations resulted in criminal charges.

Victims were targeted in eight (8) occurrences, 16 were in open-air, 11 were to businesses. There were 10 robberies that involved a vehicle being taken (or attempted to be taken).

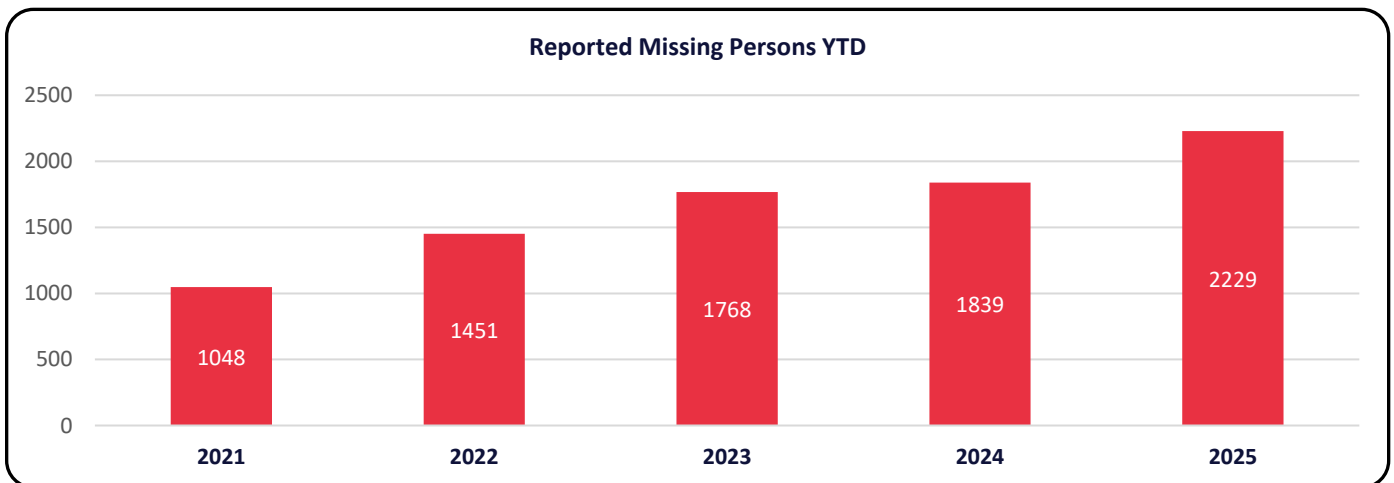


Appendix 16: Heat map of robberies in the fourth quarter

Missing Persons

In 2025, there were 2229 people reported missing. Currently, there are seven (7) outstanding missing persons from the beginning of the year that remain active investigations.

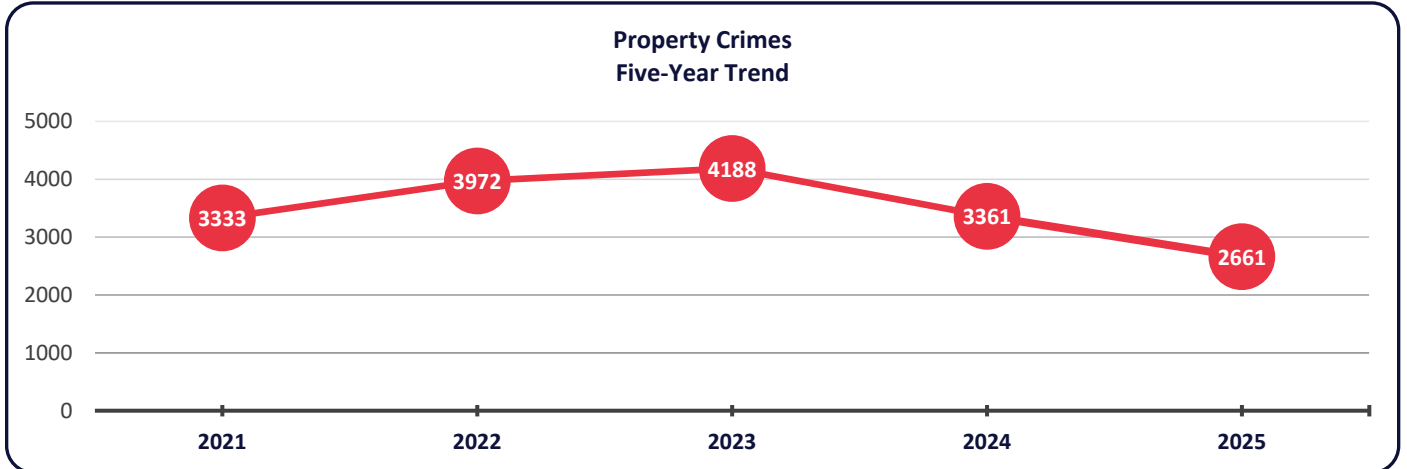
There are 16 active missing person investigations that were reported prior to 2025. These investigations are led by our Criminal Investigation Division.

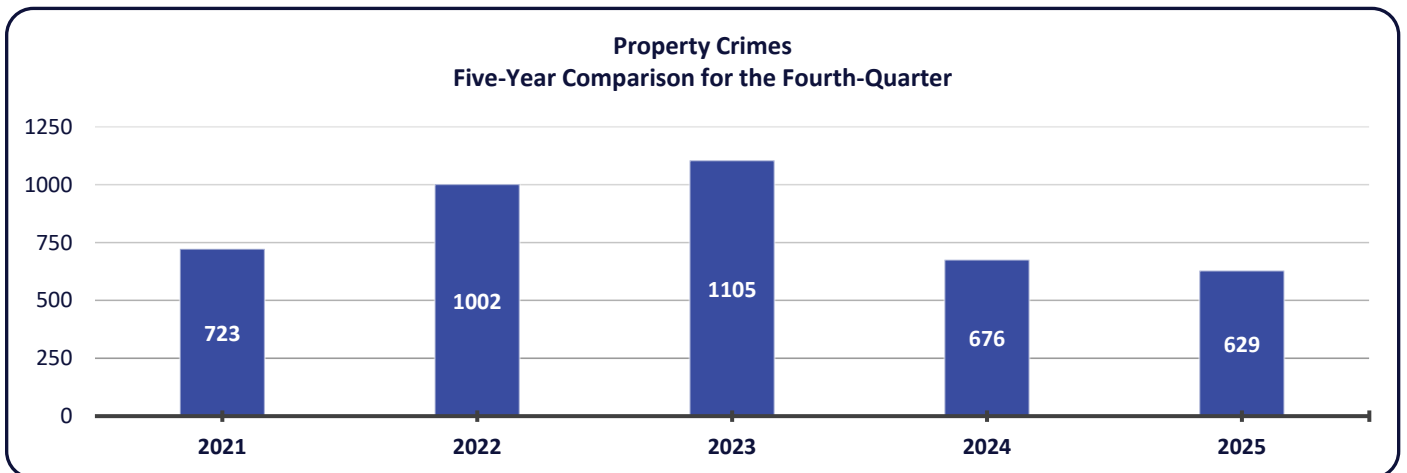
Property Crime

In 2025, there were 2661 reports of property crime, which is a 20.83% decrease from the previous year. In 402 occurrences, investigations resulted in criminal charges.



Appendix 18: five-year YTD trend

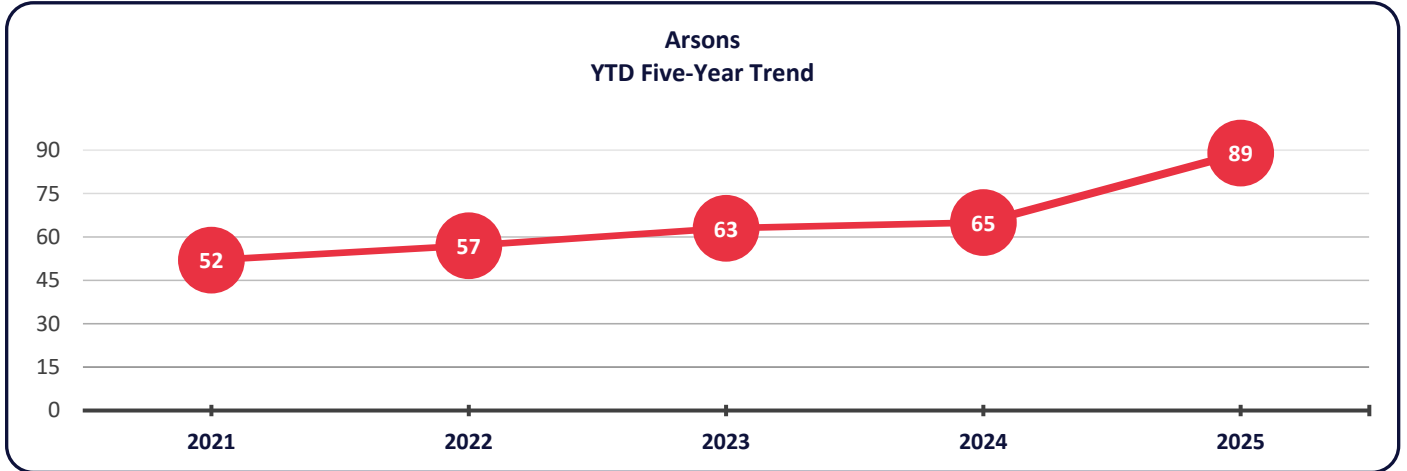
In the fourth quarter, there were 629 reports of property crime. In 83 occurrences, investigations resulted in criminal charges.



Appendix 19: five-year comparison

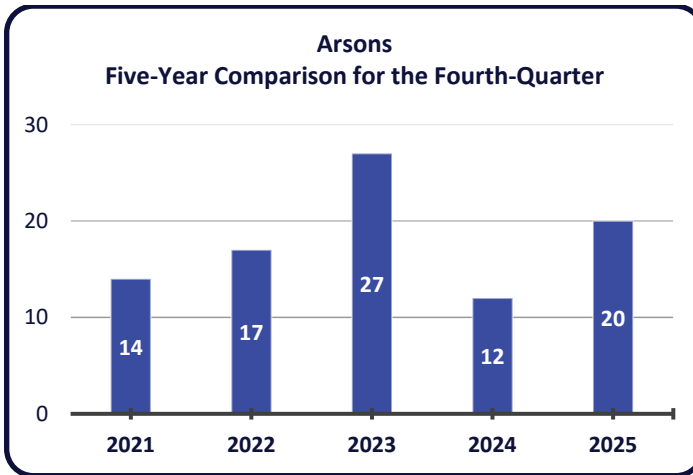
Arsons

In 2025, there were 89 occurrences of arsons. In six (6) occurrences, investigations have resulted in criminal charges.

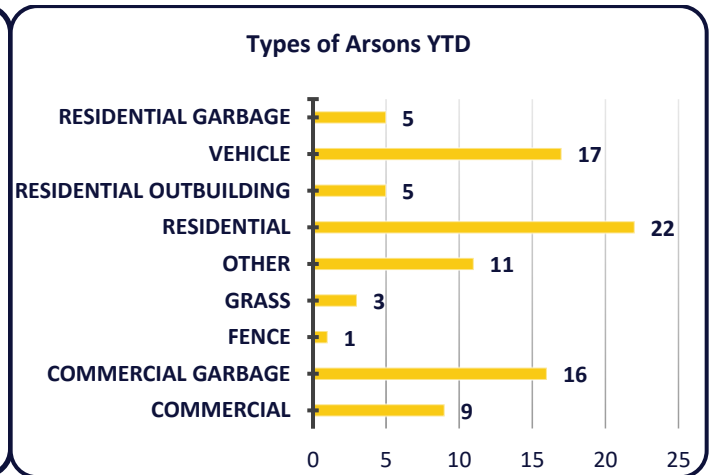


Appendix 20: five-year YTD trend

In the fourth quarter, there were 20 occurrences of arsons which is a 66.67 % increase from 2024. There have not been any investigations that have resulted in criminal charges.



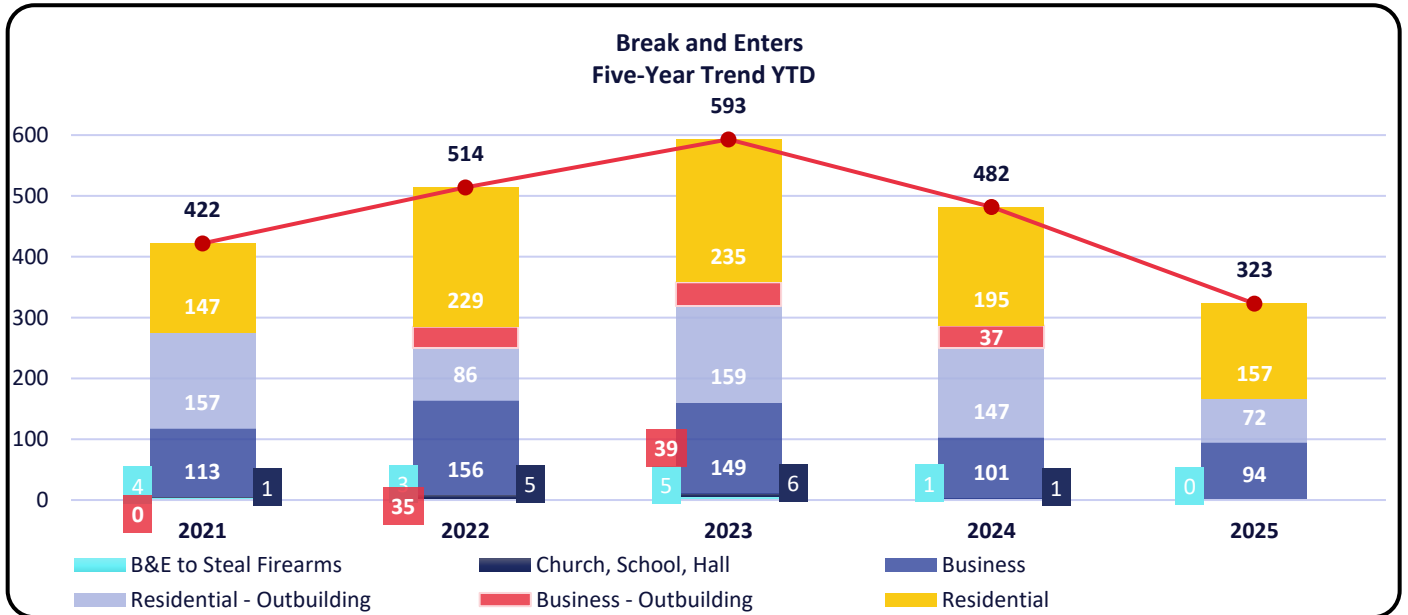

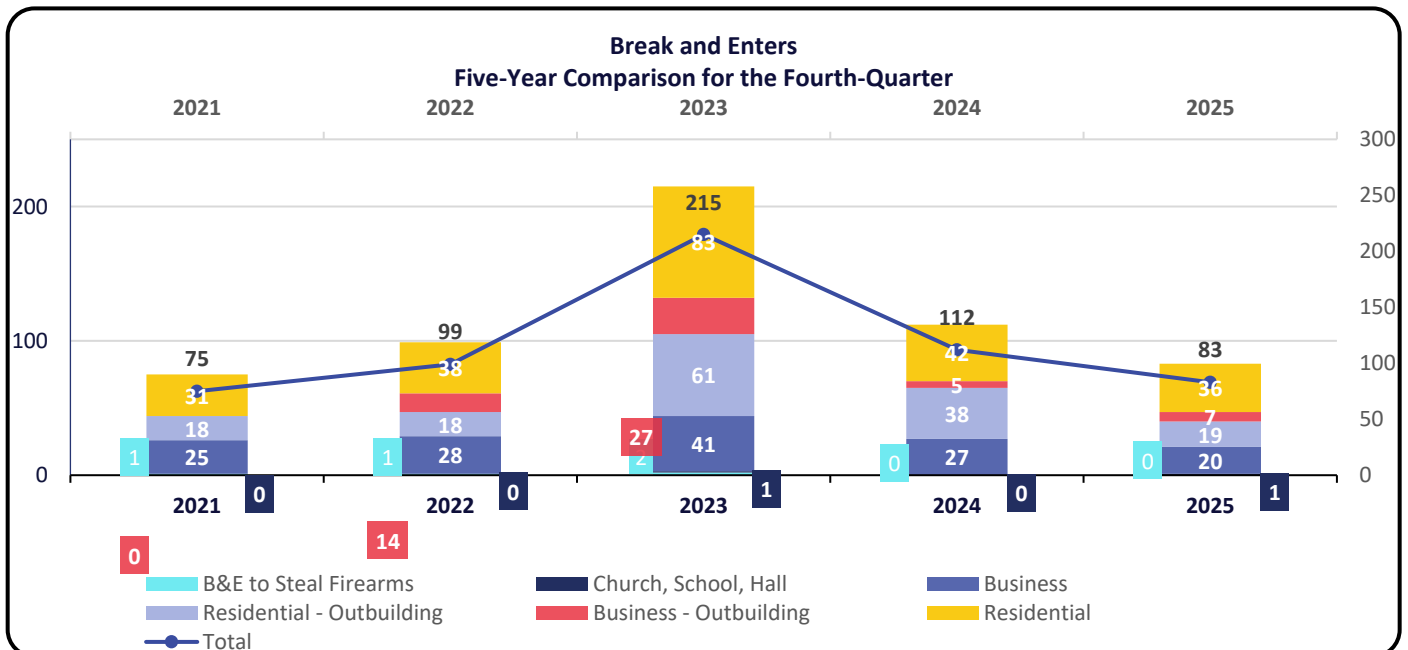
Break and Enters

In 2025, there were 323 break-and-enters, which is a decrease of 32.98% from the previous year. In 70 occurrences, investigations resulted in criminal charges.

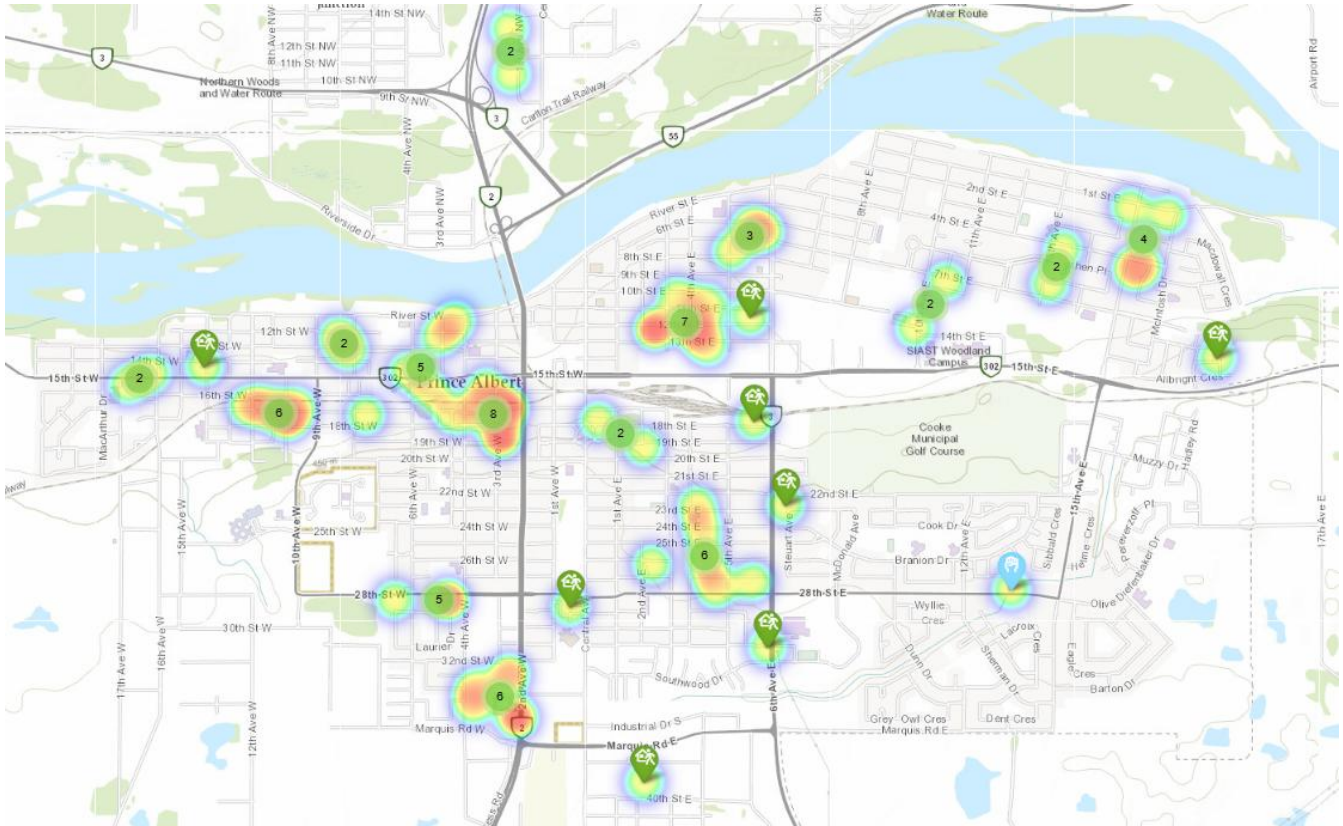


Appendix 23: five-year trend

In the fourth quarter, there were 83 break-and-enters. In 13 occurrences, investigations resulted in criminal charges.



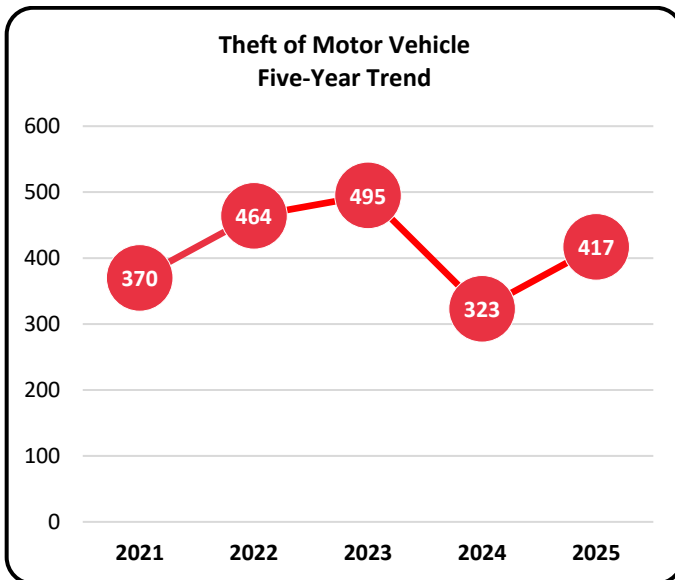

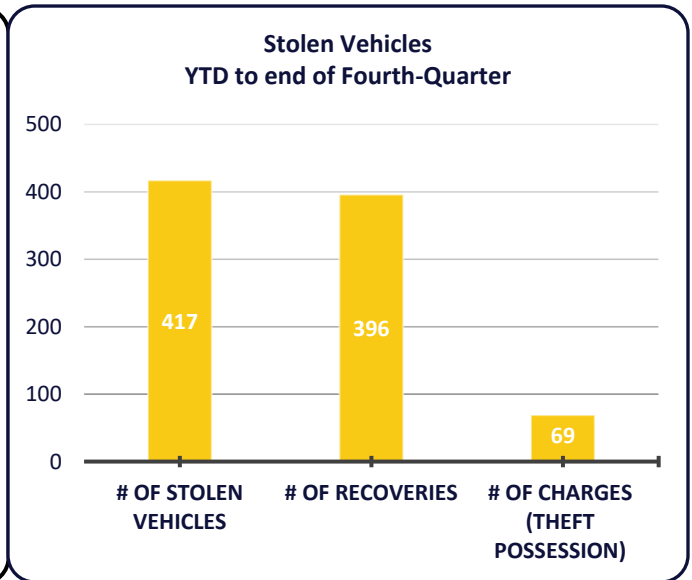
Appendix 25: Heat map of all breaks and enters the fourth quarter.

In 2025, there were 417 vehicle thefts, which is a 29.10% increase from 2024. In 69 occurrences, investigations resulted in criminal charges.

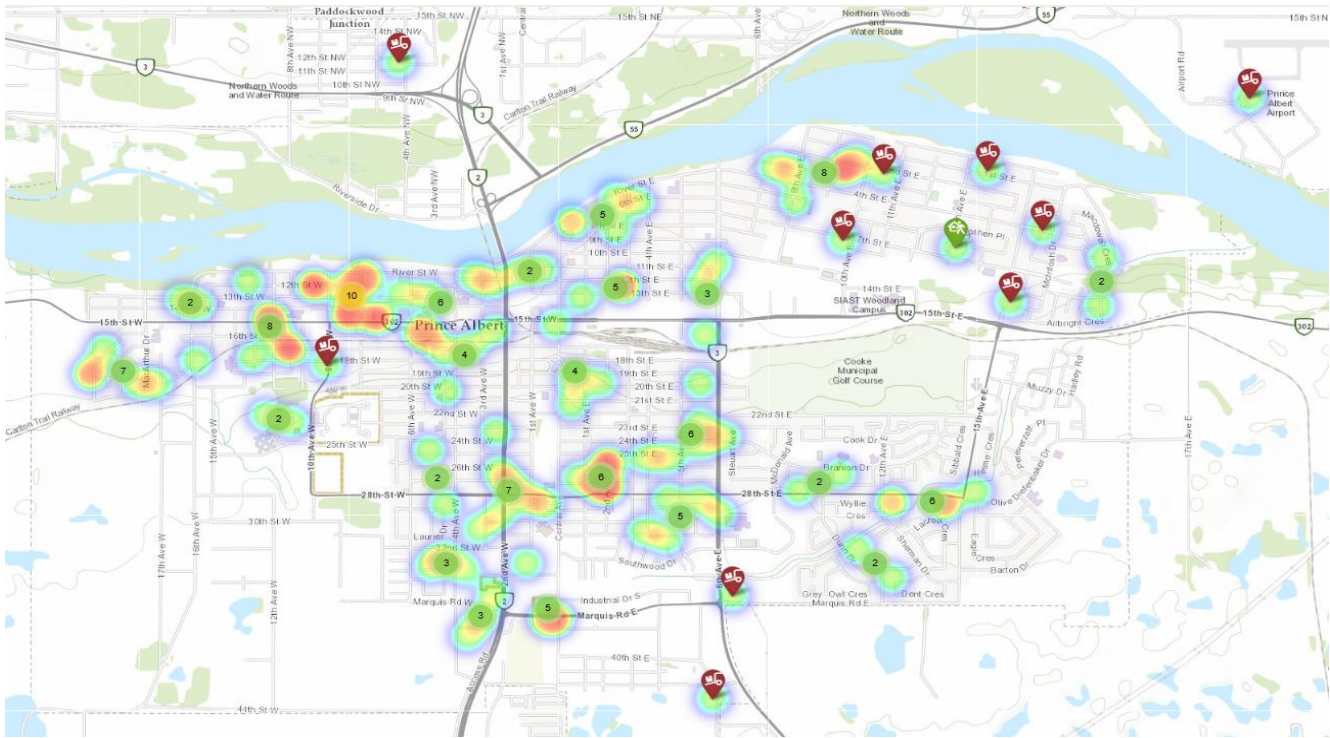


Appendix 26: five-year YTD trend

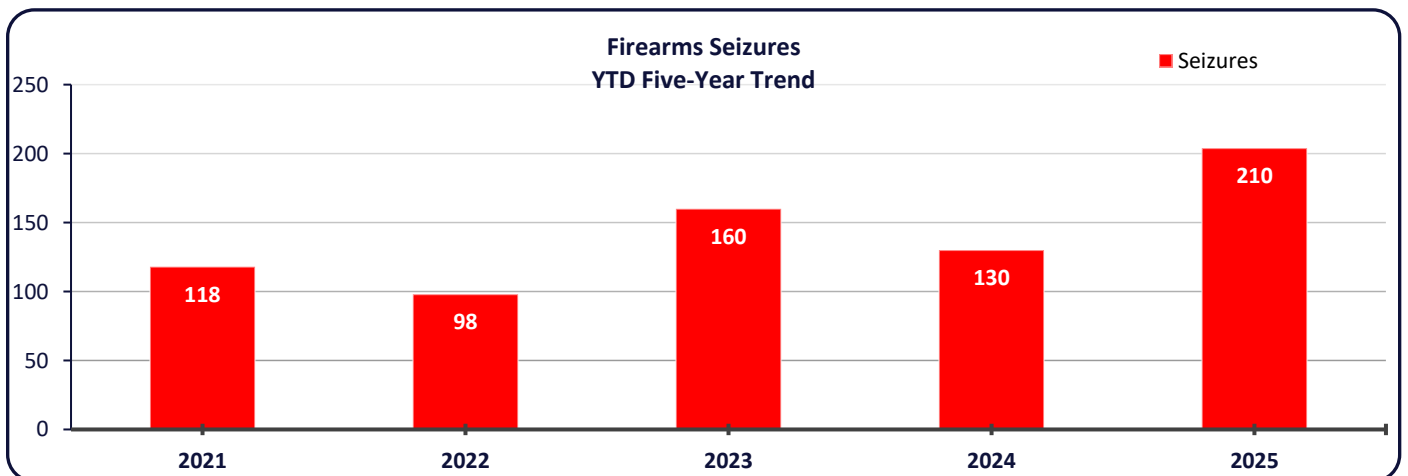
In the fourth quarter, there were 122 vehicle thefts. In 22 occurrences, investigations resulted in criminal charges.



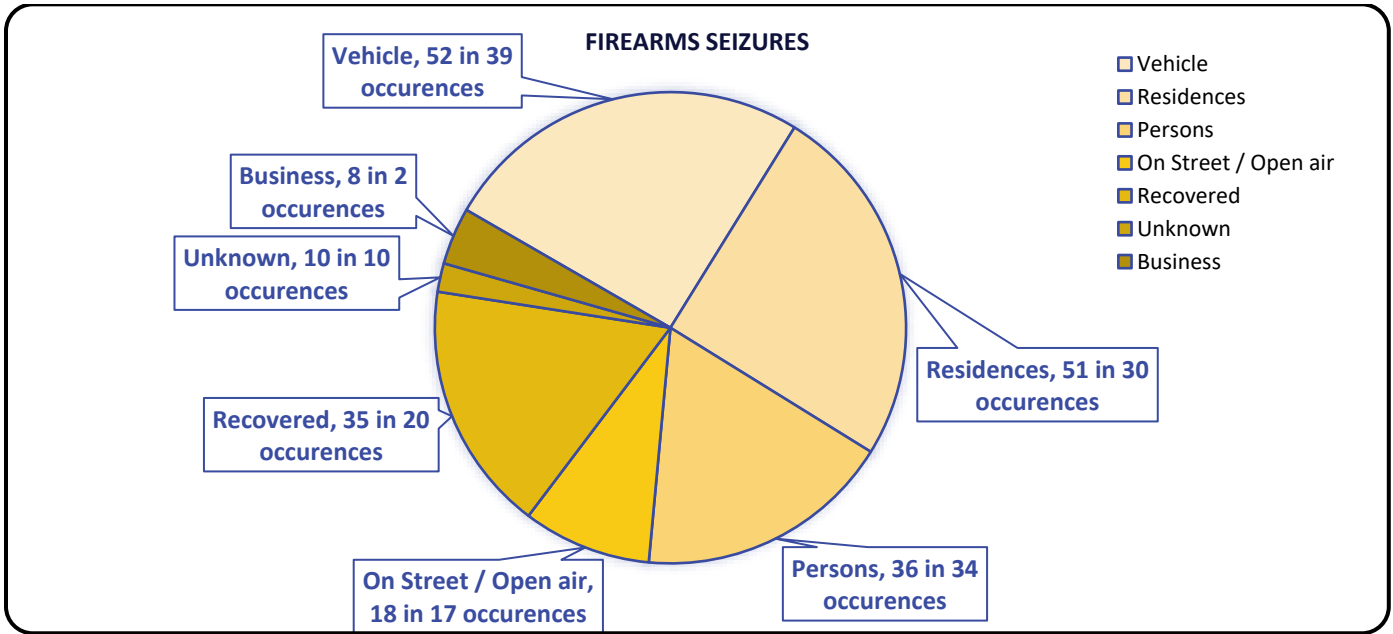
Appendix 28: heat map of vehicle thefts in the fourth quarter

In 2025, there were 210 firearms seizures in 146 occurrences. In 67 of those occurrences, investigations resulted in criminal charges.



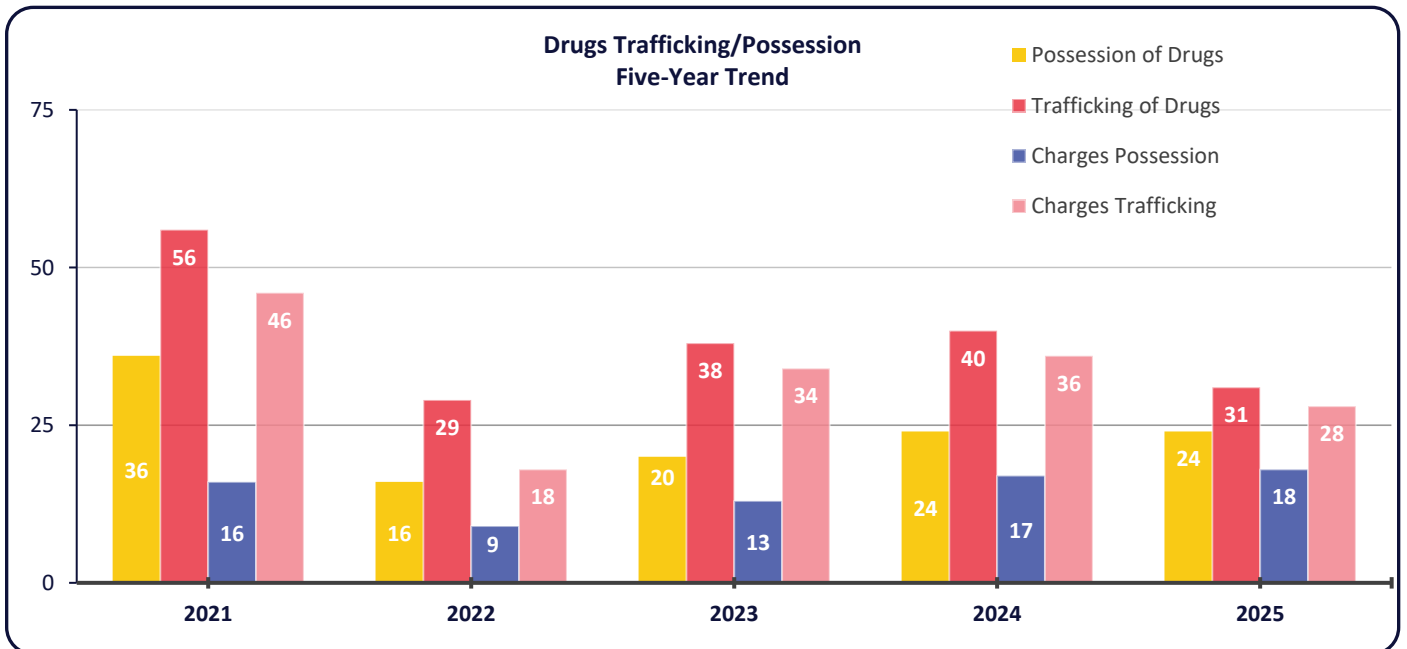
Appendix 29: five-year YTD trend firearms



Appendix 30: how/where firearms were seized YTD

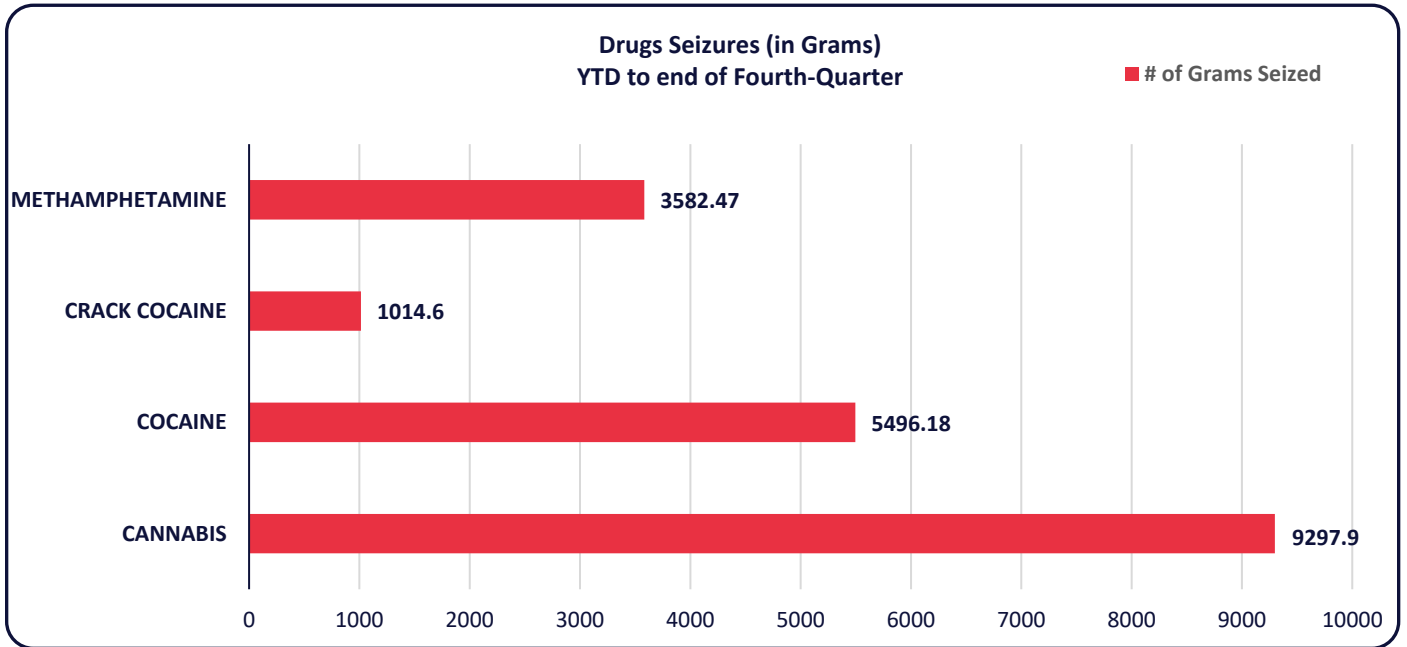
Controlled Drugs and Substances

In 2025, there were 31 drug trafficking occurrences, 28 investigations resulting in criminal charges. There were 24 possession occurrences, 18 investigations resulting in criminal charges.



Appendix 31: five-year YTD comparison

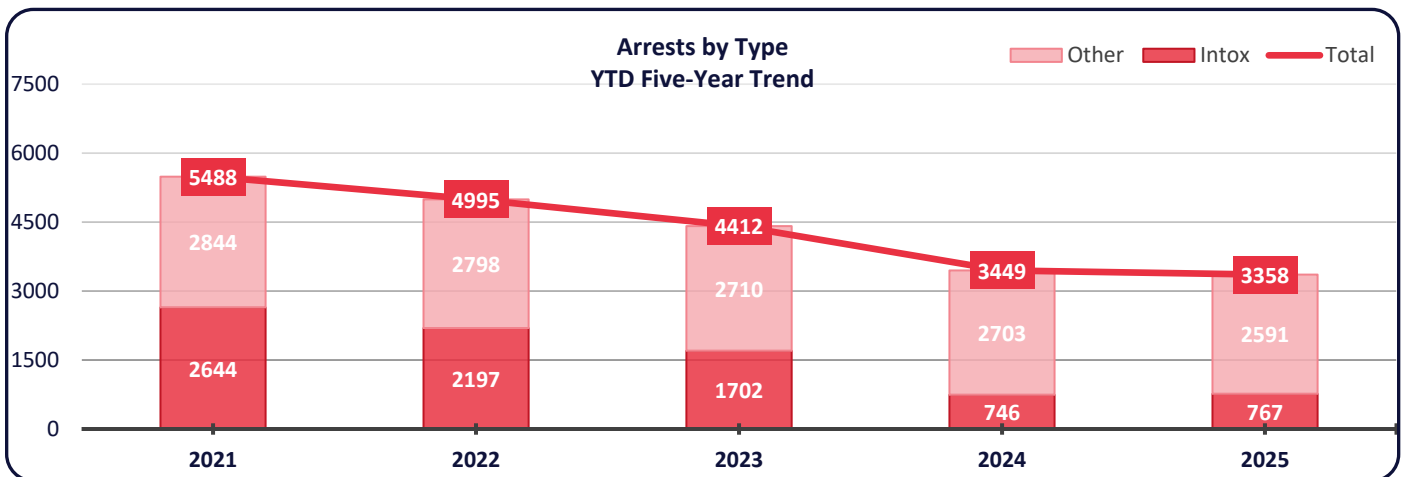
The five-year average of drug possession/trafficking occurrences is 39, the highest amount of drug seizures in 2025 was 9297.9 grams of Cannabis.



Appendix 32: quantity of drugs seized YTD (grams)

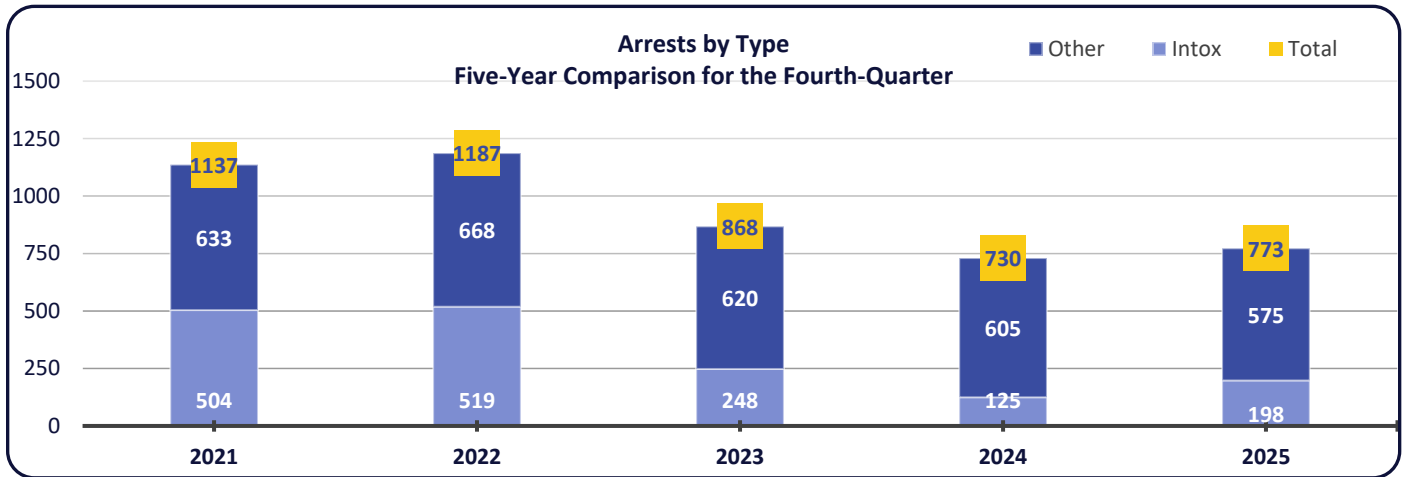
Arrests

In 2025, there were 3358 arrests, 767 were for intoxication. Total Arrests have decreased by 2.64% from the previous year.

In the fourth quarter, there were 773 arrests, 198 were for intoxication. Total arrests have increased by 5.89% from the previous year.

Impaired Driving

In 2025, there were 79 Impaired occurrences resulting in 70 charges. There were 23 Female/Women and 47 Males/Men charged. Combined Traffic Services Saskatchewan (CTSS) are responsible for 51% of those.

There were also 109 SGI Administration Suspensions, 60 for Alcohol and 49 for Drugs. Combined Traffic Services Saskatchewan (CTSS) issued 86% of those.

Mental Health

In 2025, there were a total of 880 mental health-related calls for service (which includes attempt suicide, mental health events, and mental health warrants). Of these, 439 occurred between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., while 441 occurred between 5:00 p.m. and 8:00 a.m. The Police and Crisis Team (PACT) were involved in 695 occurrences.

Arrest Warrants

In 2025, there were a total of 2144 warrants executed including 447 for other agencies. In the fourth quarter, 647 new warrants were issued. There were 338 warrants executed, and 105 of those were issued by other agencies. There are currently 817 outstanding warrants.

Tickets

In 2025 there were 5877 ticket violations issued, which is a 1.31% increase from 2024.

In the fourth quarter, there were 1030 ticket violations, which is an .88% increase from 2024.

Combined Traffic Services Saskatchewan (CTSS) issued 88% of those.
